Data analysis forms a critical part of writing today.


An analytical paragraph refers to a descriptive paragraph which is usually written on the basis of a flowchart, table, graph, chart, etc. Since it is usually short, crisp, and to the point, the choice of words and grammatical structures is of utmost importance in such an analytical paragraph. Types of Analytical Paragraphs

- 1. Flowchart/Data/Graph based
- 2. Excerpt/Cue based

Format:

- 1. Title (to be written in the centre)
- 2. One paragraph including introduction, overview and conclusion. (100-120 words)


Ans. Students Performance Analysis

Analysing the performance of students not only provides an insight into how their score vary throughout the year but also helps identify areas that need more work. The survey shows that the performance of students showed some improvement in the second-term with most students scoring higher marks in maths and science in the sccond-term. The scores in maths and science were above 80 in the first-term. However, in, maths, most students scored above 90 marks in the second term: Students scored between 60-70 marks in Hindi and English, which means more effort is required in the two subjects, especially in Hindi as the students scored less in the second term. There was marginal, improvement in the second- term marks in English and Social science. However, efforts must be made to ensure that the overall scores improve in the next academic session, hence, teachers must plan accordingly in order to help students score higher marks. Students must be given additional practice so that more students score 100 marks in Maths and Science. This will help improve the school's performance in the board examination.


Ans. The Pain of Animals

Ans. Dubai Gold Sales 2002

The line graph presents an analysis of gold sales in Dubai over the course of 2002, measured in millions of Dirhams. The year opened with sales at around 200 million Dirhams and displayed a rising trend, reaching a crest at 350 million Dirhams by March. This peak signifies a robust period for the gold market in Dubai. Subsequently, a decline was observed, with sales dipping to a low of 110 million Dirhams by July, illustrating a sharp fall in the market. Interestingly, there was a significant rebound in August, where sales momentarily doubled, only to fall back to the July figures in September. The remainder of the year saw the sales stabilize at 180 million Dirhams before a modest uptick in December. Overall, the graph indicates a volatile year for the gold industry in Dubai, with peaks and troughs aligning with various economic factors or seasonal trends. Ans. Women Education in Bilaspur

The given table depicts the scenario of women education in the area of Bilaspur. Column 2 shows the details about number of colleges, schools, girl students and distant learning centres in the area, in the year 1995, while column 3 shows same details in the year 2010 and how things have changed for better in 15 years. When we are talking about the number of schools and colleges for girls, they have increased from 10 to 15 and 3 to 4 respectively. This shows that with changing times more girls want to get enrolled in educational institutions which shows that they are more keen on getting educated than they were before and the government is listening to their demands as well. The numbers might not be huge but it is a good start. Even the numbers of girls that are enrolled in schools and colleges have increased from 10,000 to 16,000 and 6,000 to 10,000 respectively which shows that along with the government, these girls are even supported by their families and are not forced to quit studies and learn household chores. All of these measures have helped in increasing the literacy rate significantly, from just 35% to 55%, which is more than half of the female population getting educated. Thanks to the establishment of 3 new distant learning centres, girls who might not be able to leave their houses can also get educated. This step is a major and a great one taken by the government. In conclusion we can say that girls are now getting huge support from their families as well as the government, to be educated and this will help in the growth of the country as and when more and more people realise the importance of education.
