Answer the following questions briefly :

Q1. The narrator asks the boys, "Must you work so hard? You both look rather tired." The boys replied, "We are not complaining, sir." What do you learn about the boys from their reply?

Ans. The reply of the boys shows that they were working hard out of their own will. Nothing was forced upon them. The boys were brave, courageous and had a strong will power to face the challenges which life threw upon them. They did not feel sad and dejected, which indicates that they faced challenges in life with confidence.

Q2. The story is full of suprises. Briefly mention any two such instances.

Ans. Firstly, the narrator was surprised to see the boys who sold strawberries the previous day bending over shoeshine boxes beside the fountain in the public square, doing brisk business. Secondly, he was surprised to see the two boys seated at the bedside of a girl of twenty who resembled the little boys. He was taken aback on hearing about the life of these children from the nurse attending on the girl at the hospital.

Q3. What led the boys to dislike the Germans?

Ans. The boys disliked the Germans, because their beloved father was killed during the war, leaving them all alone in the world. Besides, a bomb had destroyed their home depriving them of a comfortable and cultured life. The 3 siblings were thrown out onto the streets to face the misfortunes of life.
