Shakespeare wrote in one of his plays, "I wasted time, and now doth time waste me." It is true that a person who wastes even a little bit of time loses wonderful opportunities that he could have otherwise availed of by utilising that time. All the great leaders have one thing in common: They wisely utilise every moment of their time. When other people are busy wasting time in laziness, great men are busy making plans for the future. There is no person in history who wasted his time and still managed to achieve greatness.
- (4) Therefore, there is a great need to manage time wisely. "Careful Time Management" refers to careful planning of time and sincere execution of this plan. This is the only mantra to attain success in any endeavour. A simple change in outlook and some modification in one's daily routine can result in a big jump forward towards greater achievements.
