The name 'Bharat' is given by its inhabitants. It is one of the oldest names for our country, derived from Sanskrit. The term 'Bharata' first appears in the Rig Veda, where it refers to one of the main groups of Vedic people known as the Bharata.

2. Write a note on the following:

- a. Gyagar and Phagyul

India is known as 'Gyagar' and 'Phagyul' in Tibetan. The term 'Gyagar' means 'Land of the Gods' or 'Land of the Noble Ones,' reflecting the deep spiritual connection that Tibetans have with India, especially because of Buddhism.

The name 'Phagyul, which means 'Land of Abundance,' highlights the rich natural resources and beautiful landscapes of India. Both names reflect how important India

is to the Tibetan people and their history, as it represents a place of learning, spirituality, and cultural exchange.

b. Jambudvīpa

The term 'Jambudvīpa' means 'the island of the fruit of the jamun tree,' a common tree native to India, also known as the 'Jambul' or 'Malabar plum tree.' In ancient Indian cosmology, Jambudvīpa referred to one of the continents, with India as its central region. Over time, as Indian civilisation developed, Jambudvīpa came to symbolise the Indian subcontinent in both cultural and geographical contexts.

3. Discuss how the meaning of the name 'Hindustan' changed across different historical.

Different countries and cultures have their unique names for India, often based on historical trade, geography or cultural connections.

For example, the ancient Greeks called India 'Indos,' and the Persians used the name 'Hindustan.' In China, India is known as 'Yìndù' while in Tibet, it is called 'Bod'. In Southeast Asia, countries such as Thailand and Indonesia historically referred to India as 'Bharata.
