Ans. This tells us that the narrator and his friends started to dislike Private Quelch.

- (b) What made the narrator and his friends live in terror of Private Quelch's approach? Ans. Private Quelch's habit of showing off his knowledge and correcting publicly the mistakes of his colleagues, so that they were embarrassed, made them live in terror of Private Quelch's approach.
- (c) What is meant by the word 'remorseless'?
  Ans. The word 'remorseless' means 'without guilt'.
- (d) Which quality of Quelch is highlighted in the extract?

  Ans. The characteristic of being superior and show off is highlighted in the extract.

## Answer the following questions in brief:

1. What is a 'nickname'? Can you suggest another one for Private Quelch?

1.Did Private Quelch's day to practice take him closer towards his goals?" How can you make it out?

Ans) No, Private Quelch's daily practices did not bring him closer to his goal of getting a commission in the army. In fact, his constant showing off and correcting of superiors, while intended to impress, ultimately led to him being assigned to permanent cookhouse

duties, a significant setback. This demonstrates that his approach was counterproductive, highlighting the importance of humility and respect for authority in achieving one's ambitions.

Private Quelch's ambition was to secure a commission, and he believed that showcasing his knowledge and intelligence would impress his superiors and lead to promotion. He constantly interrupted lectures, corrected his instructors, and generally acted as if he knew more than everyone else. This behavior, while perhaps intended to demonstrate his capabilities, ultimately alienated his peers and angered his superiors, particularly Corporal Turnbull.

His habit of interrupting and correcting Corporal Turnbull during a lecture on grenades led to Turnbull assigning him to permanent cookhouse duties as a form of punishment and a lesson in humility.
